

TO ALL THAT HAVE Skill, or Will vnto Sacred Musicke, I wish CONCORD among themfelnes, with GOD, and with their owne CONCIENCES.

Armonicall Brethren, I have bere vudertaken with no/mail labour, and charge, to bring the Tunes of the Pfalmes, Hymnes Euangelicall, and Songs Spirituall, (as they are v/ually fung throughout Great Brittaine) into one entire volume; which are so Composed, for the most pare, that the vnskilfull may with little practice, be enabled to fing them in parts, after a plausible manner.

In my opinion, 'tis too Laborious a taske for any Man to fludy the attainement of the Hebrew Musicall Accents; For the Tunes v/ed in Dauids Time are too farre remoand from our understanding. For albeit the Hebrew Muficall Characters are placed (ometimes about the Letter, fomtimes beneath, yet the knowledge of what was fignified by the/e Notes and Characters, was onely continued by Tradition, and is now utterly lost, though many at fundry times (as appeareth by their wrytings) have gone about to reusive it : But basing no better subject to worke upon, then their owne weake coniectures, they have but a little Russian Church, (who had their skill in Mussicke from

e be Græcians) thengb they differ in the placing, (because these of the Hebrewes are both aboue and beneath the Letter, these onely aboue) yet they partly resemble one another in the forme.

Againe, I finde by fundry Mannfcripts, that the Latine Church, as well in the forme of their Characters, as likewife in the placing of them, did participate of both. For first, according to the manner of the Hebrewes, they placed their Notes both aboue and beneath the Letter. Afterwards they vsed one line aboue the Letter, and placed their Notes both aboue and beneath the line, and that with a Geometricall distance, as the afcent and defcent of thefounds did require.

In proceffe of time (as all things are bronght to their perfection by degrees) they came to two lines, then to three. And Guido Aretinus, a learned man (whom Histories report to have lived in the time of Henry the 2. Emperour, in the yeare of our LORD, 1018.) was the first that innented the wniforme of the Scale, (which we terme Gam-vt) and brought in the foure lines, which was and onely is now vsed in the Church for Phonaskes, distinguished by the Gregorian, Ambrolian, and Perigrine Tones, comprebended in the distance of a Diatellaron or a Diapente, viz. a fourth or a fifth, or the Harmonicall proportions of selqui tertia and selqui altera : and by degrees it came to the diftance of a Diapalon, which is an eight, and a Duple proportion; in which three proportions all Simple and Compound Harmony confiftetb, by the Plagall and Authenticke division of the Tones and Tropes. The which Phonaskes are explained by the Tenor part being the Faburden or Playn-long of the Plaimes, Anthems, and Responces visally fung in the Church in Prose, and Hymnes s hat

that were Composed in Verle and Meeter.

The fine lines are wied for Symphonaskes or Parts Compounded of 2.3.4.5.6. voices & c.

The fixe lines are v/ed for Instrumentall Musicke, as Organs, Harpes, Lutes, &c.

But what (oeuer the Tunes were in Dauids time, there is no question but they were concordant and Harmonious, which could not be, had they not beene dinided in parts. For if ye looke into 1 Chro. chap. 15. 16. verse, yee shall see how the Prophet David at the Reduction of the Aske, as likewije Salomon bis Sonne at the Dedication of the Temple, 2 Chro, chap. 6.31. verse, diffingnished all their Musickein parts, and appointed inch to bo Masters and Ouer-leers of it, as were most eminent for their knowledge in that kindes. as Chenaniah the chiefe Leuite, to have the chiefe place, which was to be Master of the Song: An office, which confifted not onely in the direction of the Quire; but likewise in the trayning op of others to fing, that there might be still a supply of able perfons for that fernice : Alaph the next, and fo Heman his Brother, likewije leduthun and Ethan, all of them the most renowned chanters of chose Times, and such as successively in one anothers absence, were to direct the due performance of that charge, so that not onely the voyce of the Singers, but likewije the lound of the InBruments agreed fo well together, that they seemed to be but one Sound, and one Voice.

Neither was this method confined onely to the Old Teflament, but fanctified to the Church of Christ by the prefoription of the boly Apostle S. Paul, Col 3. verse 16. Let the word of God dwell plenteously in you, in all wisedome, teaching and admonishing your owne sclues,

in Plalmes, Hymnes and Spirituall fongs, finging with a Grace to the Lord in your hearts.

I base therefore endeauoured for the fitting of euery Heartto that Plalme, which it shall most affect, to place special Tunes, proper to the nature of each Plalme, (not imitating Art so much, as the natural inclination, but icyning, one with another,) and am bold to admonish the Singers that they observe three Rules.

1. That Plalmes of Tribulation be lung with a low voice and long measure, Plal. 9, 32, 38, 51, 102, 130. 143. &c.

2. That Plalmes of Thanklgiuing be lung with a voice indifferent, neither too loud, nor too loft, and with a measure neither too swift nor too slow, Pfal. 18. 23 27. 30.31.46.48.66.81.104.105.111.118.122.124. 126.138.144.145.146.

3. That Plalmes of Reioycing be lung with a loude voice, a lwift and locund mealure, *Plal.* 33, 34, 47. 84, 95, 96, 98, 99, 108, 113, 117, 135, 136, 145, 147, 148, 150.

In all which, the observing of Time, Tune, and Earc, will produce a perfect Harmony.

Accept kindely, what I have laboured carnelily, and vie it to thy comfort. Thus I end, humbly wifting to all true Chriftian hearts, that sweet confolation, in linging prayles unto God here upon Earth, as may bring vs hereafter, to beare a part with the Quire of Angels in the Heauens.

OF THE PRAISE, Vertue, and Efficacie of the PSALMES.

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He Kingly Prophet David, Pfal. 47. 6. fayth; O fing praifes, fing praises vnto our God, Ofing praises, fing praifes, ing prailes vnto our God, Oling prailes, ing prai-fes vnto our King: Sing prailes vvith vnderftanding. Againe, Pfal. 95.2. Let vs fhew our felues glad in him with Pfalmes. And good reafon haue we to fing chearefully vnto God, for the Angels ioyne their prefence and con-gratulation with the fingers deuotion, as the fame Pfalmift fingeth, Pfal. 138. In conspettu angelorum pfallam tibi; Euen before the Gods will I fing praife vnto thee: Wherefore we ought diligently to take heed, that by our idleneffe neuligence, and want of praife. heed, that by our idlenesse, negligence, and want of practife, wee cause not the Angels to depart from vs. And indeed there is no mortall man which can expresse in words, or conceiue in thought, the vertues of the Pfalmes, and the prasses of the Lord, if with a pure and serious attention of the heart they shall be performed as they ought to be.

In the Pfalmes, are described the rewards of good, the punishments of euilmen, the rudiments of beginners, the progresse of pro-

ficients, and confummation of perfect men. The finging of Pfalmes (as fay the Doctors) comforteth the for-towfull, pacifieth the angry, forengtheneth the weake, humbleth the proud, gladdeth the humble, fitrres vp the flow, reconcileth enemies, lifteth vp the heart to heauenly things, and vniteth the Creature to his Creator, for whatfocuer is in the Pfalmes, condu-ceth to the edification benefit and confolation of markinde eeth to the edification, benefit, and consolation of mankinde.

Would'st thou make a confession, and repent thee of thy finnes? Then fing with remorfe and humility the feauen penitentiall Pfalms

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Of the Praise, Vertue, and Efficacie of the Psalmes.

Dauid, and thou shalt feele the sweet mercy of God, and thy pinde refreshed with spirituallioy.

Would ft thou pray? Then poure forth thy foule in the Pfalmes 45.54 67.70.72.86.143. For the foule of man cannot either, feelingly expressed its milery, tribulation and an quish of temptation, or more powerfully call vpon the mercy of God, then in these Pfalmes.

Would'ft thou praile the Maieftie of God, or giue him thankes for all his benefits? then fing the 103. 104. 105. 106. 107. 108. 111. 113. 144. 145. 146. 147. 148. 149. 150.

If thou be fo farre afflicted with outward and inward temptations that thou feemess to be for faken, then sing heartily the 22.64. 69. Pfalmes.

It this present life be tedious vnto thee, and that with an ardent defire thou waitest to see God, then sing the 43. 63. 84. Plalmes.

If thou finde thy felte quite deiected, and as it were forlorne in trouble, then with computcion of heart fing the 13.31.44.54.56. Pfalmes, and when thou haft found eafe and reft vnto thy foule, O fing to the praife of God, the 30.34.103.104. Pfalmes, and alwayes whether in the time of aduerfity, or profperity, fing out the fong of the three Children, wherein euery creature is inuited to praife God.

But doft thou defire to exercife thy felfe in the diuine praifes and precepts of the Lord? Content thy felfe then and fing the **119**. Pfalme, wherein although euen to the end of thy life thou thalt haue fought and fearcht all that thou canft, yet thalt thou neuer perfectly vnderftand the vertues & excellencies, or reach vnto the heights and depths which are comprehended in it: for hardly is there a verte in that whole Pfalme wherein is not mention made of Gods Law, Commandements, Teftimonies, and Precepts.

In a word, he that would give these heavenly Hymnes their due, had need to compose a Pfalme in praise of the Pfalmes, that fo the devout and ioyfull foule might with looking vp vnto God, reslect vponits owne worke, and transport it felfe vnto the quire of Angels and Saints, whose perpetualltaske is to fing their concording parts without pause, redoubling and descanting; Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God of Hosts. And it Vocall Mussické be not full enough, let the Instrumentall be added, Revelat. 15. 2. They have in their hands the Harps of God, and fing the fong of Mostes, and the fong of the Lambe, faying, Great and meruailous are thy morkes. Lord God Almighty. Amen. AN INDEX OF SVCH

And thefe moft inchimable benefics ve acknowledge & confefe to have received of thy free mercy & grace, by thinconely beloued Son Iofus Chrift. For the which therefore we thy congregation, moued by thy holy fpirit, do render to the all thanks, praife and glory for eucr and curt.
