## P R E F A C

THE greateft Part of the following Pfalms came to my Hands in a different Form from what they now appear in; the Treble Part having been the Tenor, and the Tenor Part the Treble, which rendered the Melody of the Treble uncommonly difagreeable to thofe who had been ufed to the Manner in which they are now publifhed, particularly the $100,113,119,148$, Pfalms, St. David's, St. Mary's, Canterbury, Yörk, Southwell, Windfor, and feveral other Tunes which are fung in the Parifh Churches of London, and in the Country, as fimple Melodies only; and the probable Reafon why they are not ufed in every Parifl Church in England feems to be, the Want of a correct Copy of them in four Pats. This induced me to undertake the prefent Work, which, I perfuade myfelf will meet with due Encouragement from the Clergy, efpecially thofe into whofe Churches a Set of itinerant Compofers and Pfalm Singers have introduced a Jargon of Sounds, commonly diftinguifh'd by the Name of New Singing, which is deftitute of Melody, Harmony, and every other laudable Recommendation.

It may be neceffary to obferve that the Names prefix'd to the oldeft Tunes are not thofe of the original Compofers, which are, in general, unknown, but of thofe who have added Parts to their Melodies; and as they were Profeffors of acknowledged Abilities alfo, it is no fmall Confirmation of their Excellence. They have been in continued and general Ufe from the earlieft Times, and are fill fo in London, where there is little Probability of their ever being out of Repute.

In order to render them more agreeable to the prefent Manner of performing, I have added an accompanying or Auxilliary Bafs, for a Violoncello or Baffoon, which, tho' not effential to the Performance, may be ufed in thofe Churches where there is no Organ, but where there is one, the judicious Organift will readily perceive the fundamental Bafs is better adapted to that Inftrument.

I have likewife added feveral Chants, Anthems, \&c. fuch as may eafily be performed; the Merits of which being fo well known, nothing need be here faid of them,
