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HENRI BERTINI.

The French family of musicians who bore the Italianised name of Bertini, well merited the respect and admiration their artistic attainments gained for it. The father, a teacher of music, was born in Tours in 1750, and lived in different towns in the south of France. The eldest son, Benoit Auguste Bertini, born on the 5th of June, 1780, at Lyons, received his first instruction in pianoforte playing and composition from his father, after which, from 1793 he remained for six years the pupil of Clementi in London. Here he eventually settled, and successfully practised music as a profession.

The most highly gifted member of the family was the younger brother, Henri Bertini, designated "*Le jeune*," to render the name easily distinguishable from the two preceding. Henri was born in London on the 28th of October, 1798, and received at an early age an excellent musical training from his father and brother.

At the age of six he was taken to Paris, where—not reckoning his concert-tours—he afterwards resided for the most part. When scarcely twelve years old he made his first concert-tour through Holland, the Netherlands, and Germany, accompanied by his father, and this laid the foundation of a fame which rapidly spread over Europe, bringing him into prominence as a pianoforte virtuoso and composer. Wherever he appeared he won for himself universal respect and a recognition of his powers, owing to the precision and finished style which characterised his performances

(a style which inclined strongly to the Cramer and Hummel school of virtuosity). He was also accounted no mean performer on the harp. After passing some time in England and Scotland, he settled in 1821 in Paris as a much esteemed and highly remunerated pianoforte teacher, occasionally paying a visit to London. At the approach of old age he withdrew to his villa, *Meylan*, near Grenoble, where he died,

October 1st, 1876.

As a performer Henri Bertini excelled alike in phrasing and execution, and all his compositions, which are remarkable for freshness of fantasy, gracefulness, and a natural flow of melody, bear the true stamp of the highly cultured musician. His most valuable work is, however, an admirable course of studies, universally admitted by pianists to be among the best of their kind, and ranking in point of merit with other standard works by Clementi,

Cramer, and Czerny. They are of great technical value whilst being melodious and harmonically interesting, especially Opera 100, 29 and 32 (in which order they may be looked upon as preparatory to Czerny's Op. 299, and Cramer's studies). Another much esteemed work is his pianoforte school. The remaining works embrace trios, sextets, serenades, a nonet for pianoforte and wind instruments, variations, fantasias, &c. Nearly 200 have appeared in print, a complete list of which is given by Féétis.
