Owing to certain peculiarities of the Russian alphabet, the name of this composer has various spellings; in some musical dictionaries, including Riemann's Lexicon, it is spelled "Schtscherbatschew" which would apparently tend to make it even less pronounceable. At all events, Stcherbatchew was a member of the younger group of Russian composers which included Borodin, and he created principally for the piano; one work, the "Fairies and Pantomimes", Op. 8, consisting of sixteen detached pieces, having had great success. It is said that he was a great admirer of Schumann, and indeed, study of his works reveals the tendency toward romanticism so often present in the German master's works.
