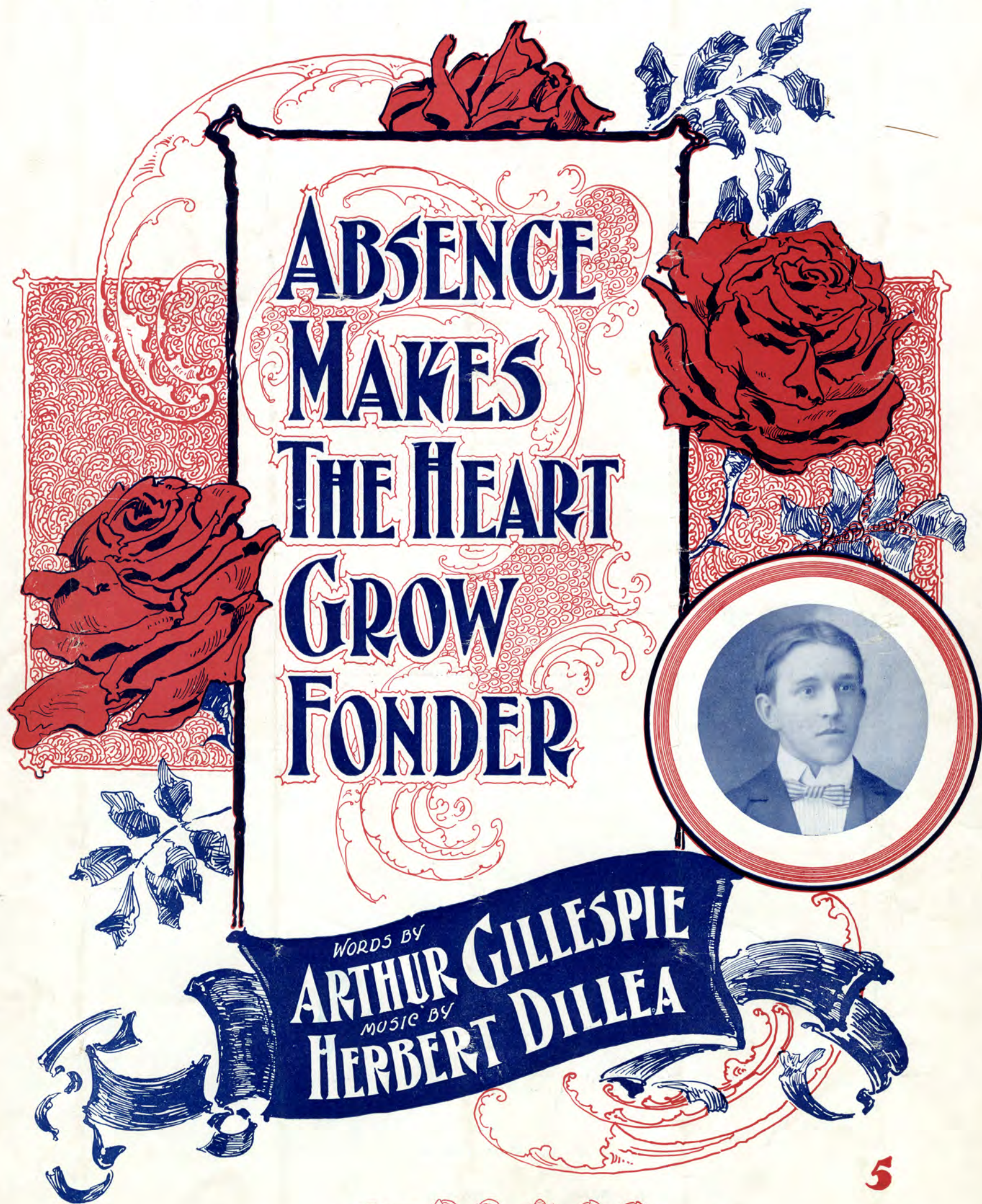

A big coon ballad success. Receives six encores nightly. Melody sweet and pleasing.
- I SHALL HAVE TO TELL IT TO ALBERT, PRINCE OF WALES, words by Will West 50
A character swell song of excellent quality.
- I KNOW NOT WHY..... words and music by Herbert Dillea 50
A charming little high grade encore song.

Beautiful sentiment. Fine, flowing waltz refrain.

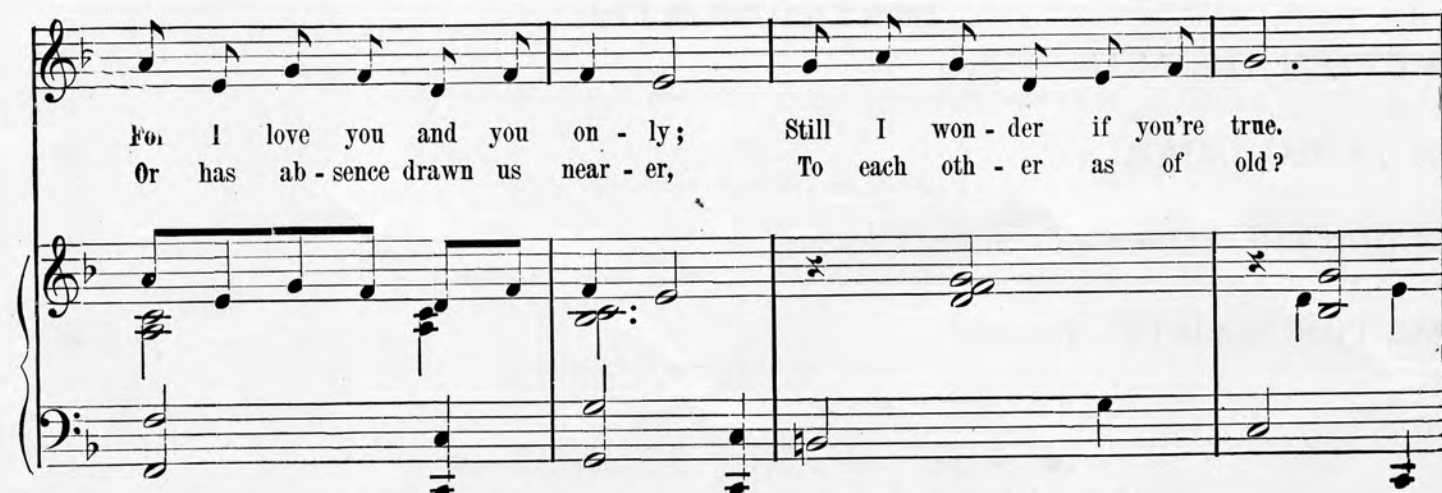
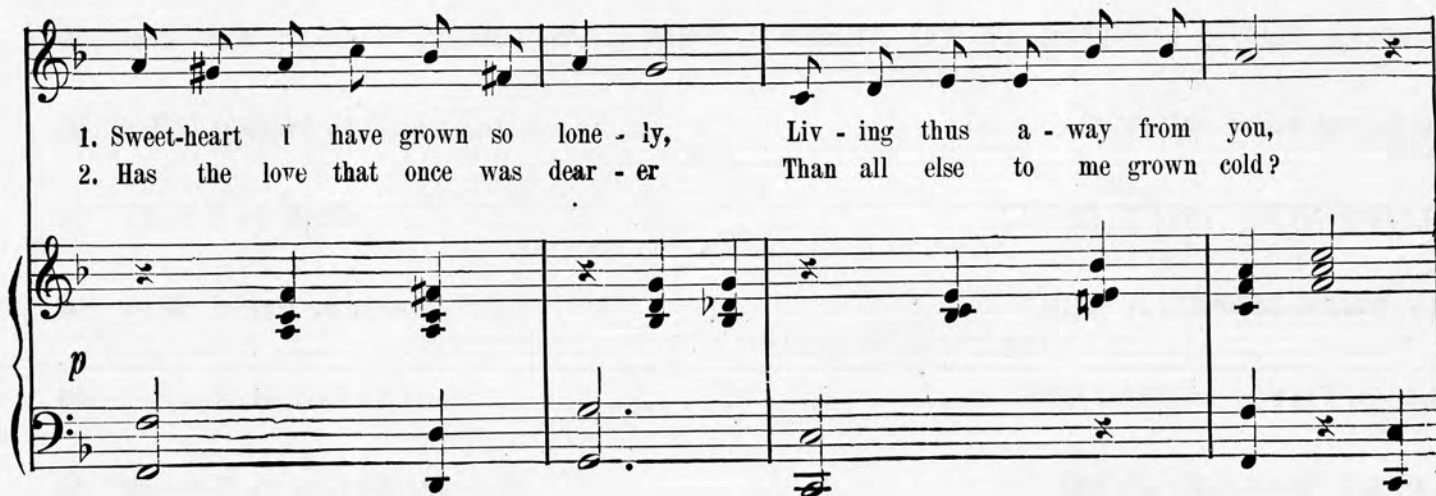

A tragic descriptive song, true to every day life.	
VISIONS OF HOME	50
As the name indicates, a quiet song of the hearth. A "clean song" with particularly sweet melody.	
NELLY KELLY. (Music by Sam'l Siegel)	50
A light, catchy bit, popularized in the West,	
MELINDA JENKINS' WEDDING DAY	50
Universally conceded to be one of the "neatest" coon oddities published.	
AIN'T YO' COMIN' ROUND TO SEE ME ANY MORE ?	50
A most tuneful darkey song—the pleading kind. Chorus lends itself to beautiful quartette harmony.	
ROSIE CLANCEY	50
Another of the "catchy" order, with a somewhat different refrain. Story pretty, melody very taking. Not a "lumpy, dumpty, dee" song, on the contrary, has a good story.	
HAD ENOUGH OF BLUFFIN' GO 'WAY MAN.	50
"Coon," of course. Acknowledged by leading professionals to be among the hits of the season. Seems to have the proper "stuff" in it.	
GOLDEN MAXIMS TAUGHT BY MOTHER	50
Purely a home song and a really beautiful one. The subject "Mother," never dies when treated properly.	
IF I THOUGHT YOU LOVED ANOTHER (It would break my heart I know).	
	Music by Alfred Solman 50
One of the most beautiful love ballads written by these clever writers. Published in Two Keys.	
THE SONGS THE BOYS ARE SINGING IN THE CAMP TO-NIGHT	50
A song that will last for a many, many years. The refrain introduces two good old "stand-bys"	
THOUGH SHE'S NOTHING TO THE WORLD, SHE'S ALL THE WORLD TO ME	50
A lover's boast. Telling true devotion in verse and melody.	
'TIS A LOVE SONG THAT I SING THEE	50
A very pretty song. Dainty lyric. Entrancing music.	
SHOW ME YOUR COMPANIONS, AND I'LL TELL YOU WHAT YOU ARE.	
	Music by A. Solman 50
Something original in the popular song line.	
I NEVER HEARD HER SPEAK OF YOU THAT WAY	Words by J. O'Dea 50
One of those style of songs that is always welcomed by the singing public.	
AS THE WORDS WERE TOLD TO ME	Words by J. O'Dea 50
A sweet ballad that will win its way.	
BACK TO HER MOTHER'S KNEE. (Words by H. M. Wheeler)	50
A touching bal'ad, dealing with the subject of "The Prodigal Daughter."	
COME HOME TO DAD	50
Another of the pathetic style. One of the best these authors have yet attempted. A "clean story" in which "Father" is not forgotten.	
JAMIE O'BRIEN	50
The simp'e, "catchy" kind. Written in Miss Remington's best humor. A swinging chorus that is easily retained.	
OH ! SUCH A BUSINESS. (Words by Gus Edwards)	50
Acknowledged by the profession to be one of the cleverest Hebrew character songs published in years. "OH ! SUCH A BUSINESS" already becoming a "by word."	
I'VE GOT MA HABITS ON	50
A great coon song, which outrivals these clever writers.
